

### **Understanding the Supply Chain Crisis**

This summer was one of the hardest for our company regarding inventory. While all our supplied items are made in the USA, from Maine to Florida, from Massachusetts to California, they depend on raw materials that are either imported or grown nationally. There were, and actually still are, many logistical problems with the movement of goods and services around the country.

Why the disruptions? If there was a single cause, we could reasonably fix the problem, but we are at a point now where fixing it isn't a simple matter. Panic buying for some items depleted inventories, cyber-attacks disrupted food and fuel supplies and transit issues through the Suez Canal backed up deliveries. Topped with natural disasters, incredibly high truck driver shortages, exponentially increased labor, freight and container costs, and covid related labor shortages, the result is a pressured manufacturing and distribution chains. Unfortunately, no corrections are large enough or swift enough to alter the current course of rising costs throughout the economy.

At Island Ice Cream we are in direct contact with our manufacturers, keeping us updated on what to expect so we can continue to provide alternatives as needed. For example, this summer we experienced the "Sponge Bob drama", and although Sponge Bob was unavailable, we were able to replace it with other character face pops. Even if we had to substitute an item for the short term, your customers always had plenty of products to choose from.

Here at Island, we are working hard to provide you with the best experience and choice of products. Ice cream is comfort food, but the road from raw milk to the sundae is a long one.
